

It was a gorgeous October afternoon, sunny and mild.

Mike Curren, assistant manager in charge of trees and shrubs (among other things), was prepared to give us an informative talk on one of his favorite subjects — conifers. Mike has worked for Summer Winds since 2000, working his way up from "hole-digger to selling, talking and ordering". He makes an annual trip to Oregon searching for unusual specimens for the garden center and also for his own vast collection.

Conifers, distinguished by cones which hold the seeds of the plant, are generally evergreen, but not always. Ones that do not have needles include Ginkgo, Bald Cypress and Dawn Redwood.

Conifers usually need full sun, but not always. Deep shade is not good-some might survive, but they will be sparse. The following can tolerate light shade: Cephalotaxus (Plum Yew), Chamacyparis obtusa (Cypress), Crytomeria (Bald Cypress), Microbiota (Cypress), Picea abies (Norway Spruce), Picea orientalis (Oriental Spruce), Taxus (Yew), Sciadopitys (Japanese Umbrella Pine), Thuja (Arborvitae) and the Hemlocks. Firs do not do well in St. Louis, succumbing to our summer heat and humidity.

Conifers come in all sizes:

- Miniature 1-2 feet in height, growing less than 1 inch per year.
- Dwarf up to 8 feet in height, growing less than 6 inches per year.
- Intermediate 8 to 15 feet in height.
- Large any tree more than 15 feet in height.

It's possible to keep larger confers small by pruning or cutting their candles (the growing tips of the tree).

Mike's tips for planting conifers in St. Louis are:

- Plant in spring, March into May, or in fall, late September to late Oct.
- Drainage, Drainage, Drainage. Except Bald Cypress and Dawn Redwood, most need GOOD drainage.
- Dig a wide hole and plant the root ball three inches higher than the surrounding soil grade. On a hillside plant the backside of the root ball level with the hill and build up the front side.
- Water, but don't over water. Conifers prefer 'drip' watering, a slow, steady flow on the top of the root ball, about one inch a week. Create a routine for watering, especially newly planted conifers. Watch to see how many days it takes for the top of the root ball to dry to determine how often to water.
- Needle browning in the center of conifers is normal as is seasonal needle drop, but if tips begin to brown it can be a sign of stress, pests or other diseases.

Thanks Mike for introducing us to your world and giving us a source for the bones and winter interest in our hosta beds.

I'm curious to hear how JoAnn Rawson's new miniatures over-winter in their new trough homes. Keep us posted.

Ben Vernooij PPAF <m s=""> (Fransen/Vernooij) A very striking and fully tetraploid form of H.'First Frost'. Its unbelievably thick blue leaves have a very wide feathered creamy-yellow border. Large lavender flowers. 'Ben Vernooij' differs from 'Autumn Frost' in that the leaves are thicker. Grows slower than its parent\$10.00</m>		
Cranberry Wine <m> (Sisson) H.'Cranberry Wine' is a seedling from H.'Cinnamon Sticks' x H.'Tequila Sunrise'. The bright yellow pointed leaves that become chartreuse are shiny, very wavy and have wonderful substance. The petioles become cranberry-colored as the season progresses. Purple flowers appear late in the season on top of dark cranberry scapes. \$12.00</m>		
Double D Cup <m> (Asch) In the spring the plant emerges a grayish-green color looking very ordinary. Then in early June it starts to show variegation with a faint green border. The border gets darker and darker as the summer days pass and the leaves begin to cup. It looks like a different plant in late summer and with maturity comes the best cupping. \$12.50</m>		
Forbidden Fruit PPAF <m> (Fransen) Marco Fransen brings a stunning new hosta, the fully tetraploid form of H.'Orange Marmalade'. Thick leaves have glowing yellow-orange centers set off by a wide blue-green border that can be seen from across the garden. It is proving to be a vigorous grower. Lavender flowers</m>		
Frank Lloyd Wright <l> (Goodenough) Naylor Creek states this is an outstanding hosta - it's blue, it's big and it has style Large steel-blue wavy leaves come to a tapered point that turns downward and are held horizontally atop strong petioles creating a vase-shaped clump. Near white flowers appear midseason</l>		
Hands Up PPAF <s> (Fransen) This is a true tetraploid of H.'Praying Hands' with lots of great attributes that make it a superior plant. It has very thick leaves which almost feel like rubber. The leaves stay much smaller than those of the parent and have a creamy-yellow to white border that is much more defined. The dense clump will be topped with lavender flowers. \$10.00</s>		
Minnesota Wild <m l=""> (Carlson) Monty Carlson of Minnesota introduces an elegant new hosta with large heart-shaped green leaves that have great substance. The leaves are framed with a wide and variable creamy-white border with lots of ruffles. Monty says this one does not burn. \$12.50</m>		
<u>Pistache</u> <m> (Van Eechaute-2007) Stunning sport from H.'Spilt Milk'. Its leaf centers are a misted combination of several colors of green surrounded by a variable border of green and blue-green. Place the plant in a bright, but shady location. Good grower. \$10.00</m>		
Proud Sentry <m> (Dean-2008) Vigorous growing, erect, fountain shaped clump is all dressed up in its crisply pressed and edged uniform. The heavy substance of each leaf is held up and out to reveal the red slacks completing the appearance of this 'Proud Sentry' as it stands guard anywhere in the front to middle of the garden border. Pale lavender flowers\$8.00</m>		
Rocket's Red Glare <m> (Stegeman) Very attractive shiny dark green leaves are held by red petioles whose red color reaches way up into the leaf blade. The leaves have good substance and nice wavy margins. The plant is topped with lavender flowers in midsummer. \$9.00</m>		
Stand by Me <s m=""> (Fransen) This unique sport of H. 'June' has upright yellowish-green leaves with a very irregular blue border with lots of streaking toward the center. It does not get as large as its parent, but is still a vigorous grower. Lavender flowers</s>
